Empathy involves understanding another's feelings, thoughts, and wishes and then communicating this understanding back.

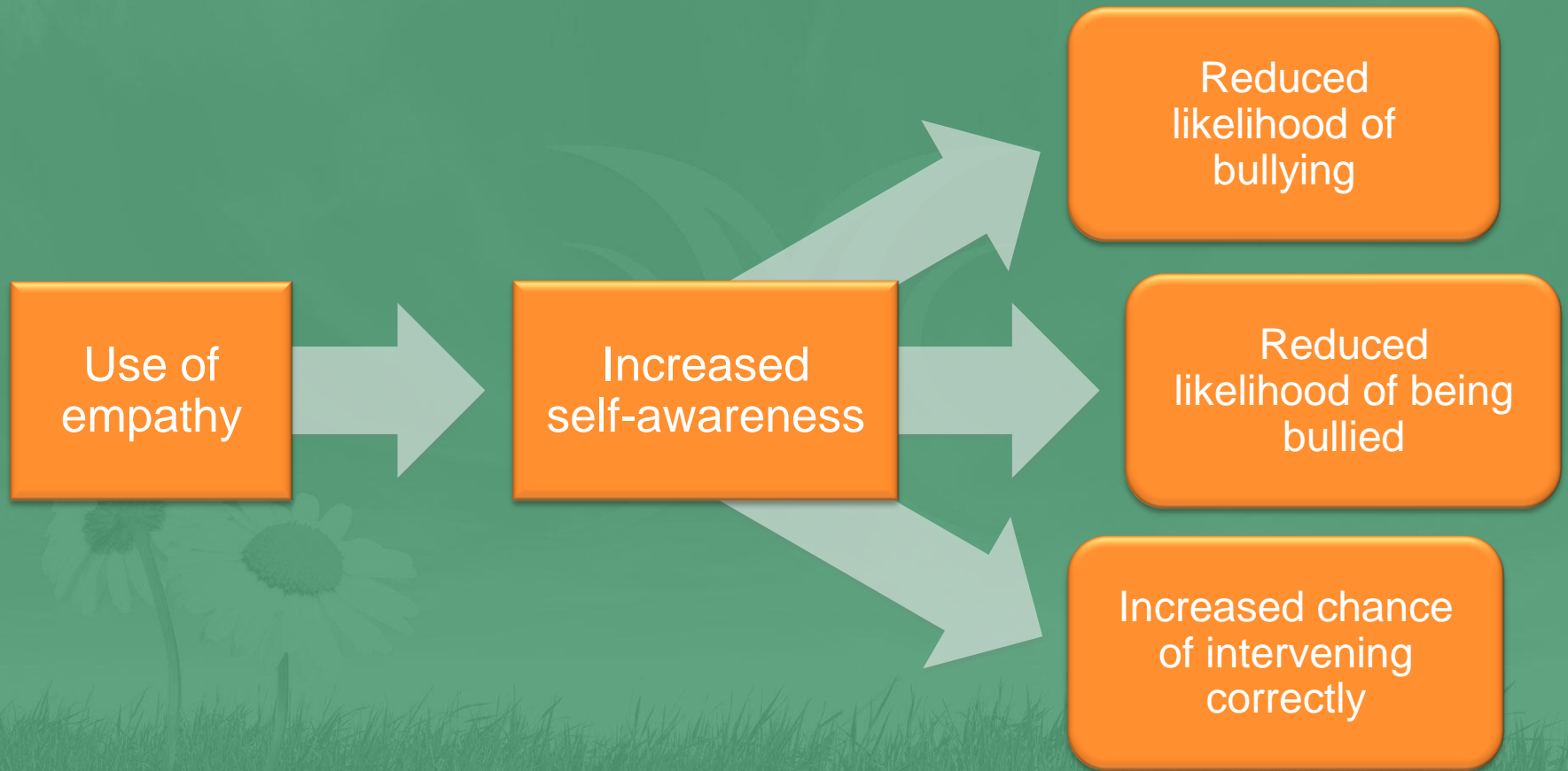

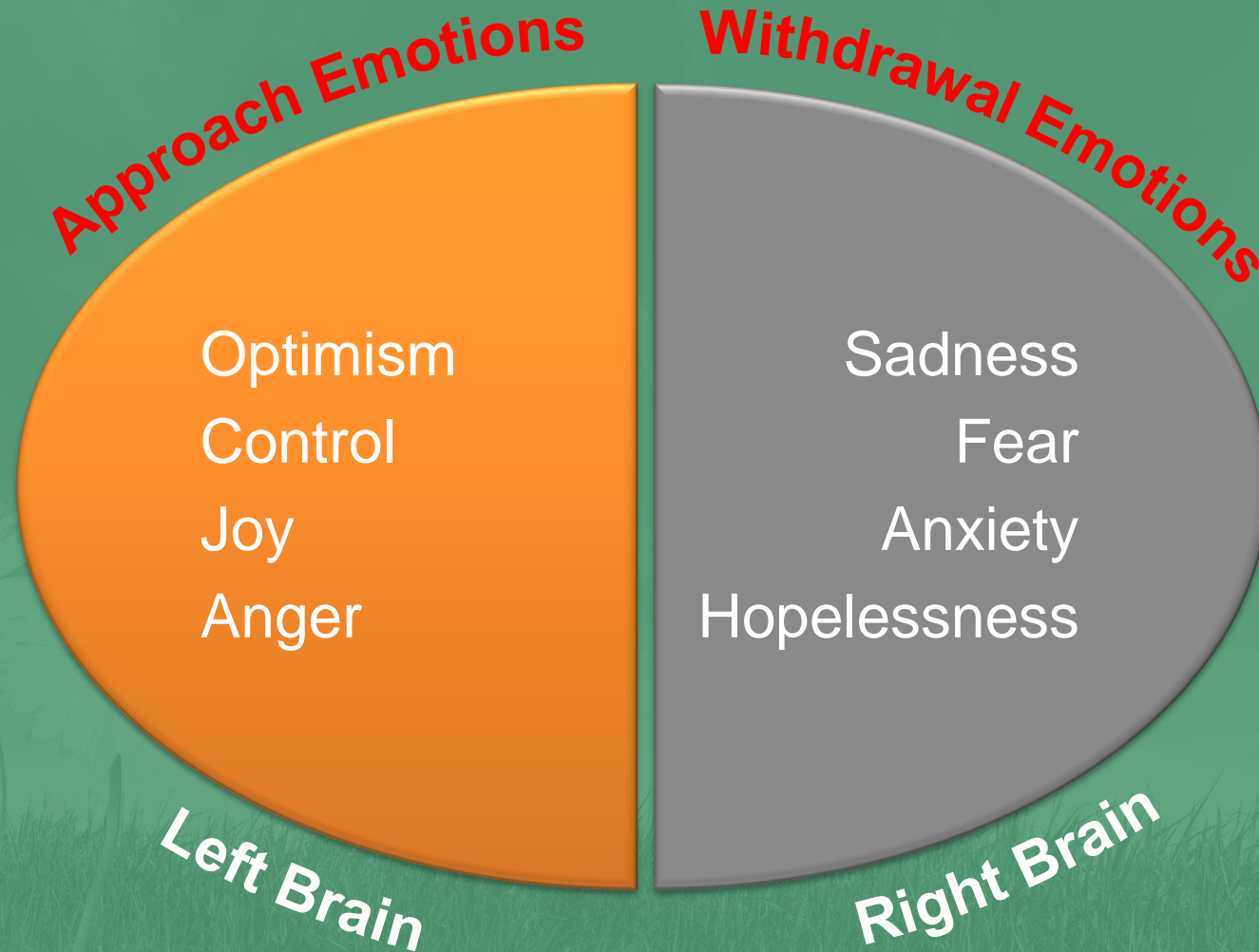


Why Is Empathy Necessary?

3. Communicate your understanding

Typical Responses vs. Empathic Responses

Child behavior/statement:

John keeps telling me he will beat me up if I don't give him my money.

Typical response:

Stand up to him!

You are scared that if you retaliate, it will make matters worse.

Typical Responses vs. Empathic Responses

Child behavior/statement:

If I tell them not to gossip, then they will gossip about me.

Typical response:

Real friends don't talk behind each other's backs. Plus, if they do it to her, they will do it to you.

Empathic response:

You want to do the right thing but are afraid they will talk behind your back.

Typical Responses vs. Empathic Responses

Child behavior/statement:

I invited him to the party even though the other kids think he is weird.

Typical response:

That was so nice. You're such a great kid.

Empathic response:

You did what you thought was right and did not let the other kids influence your decision.

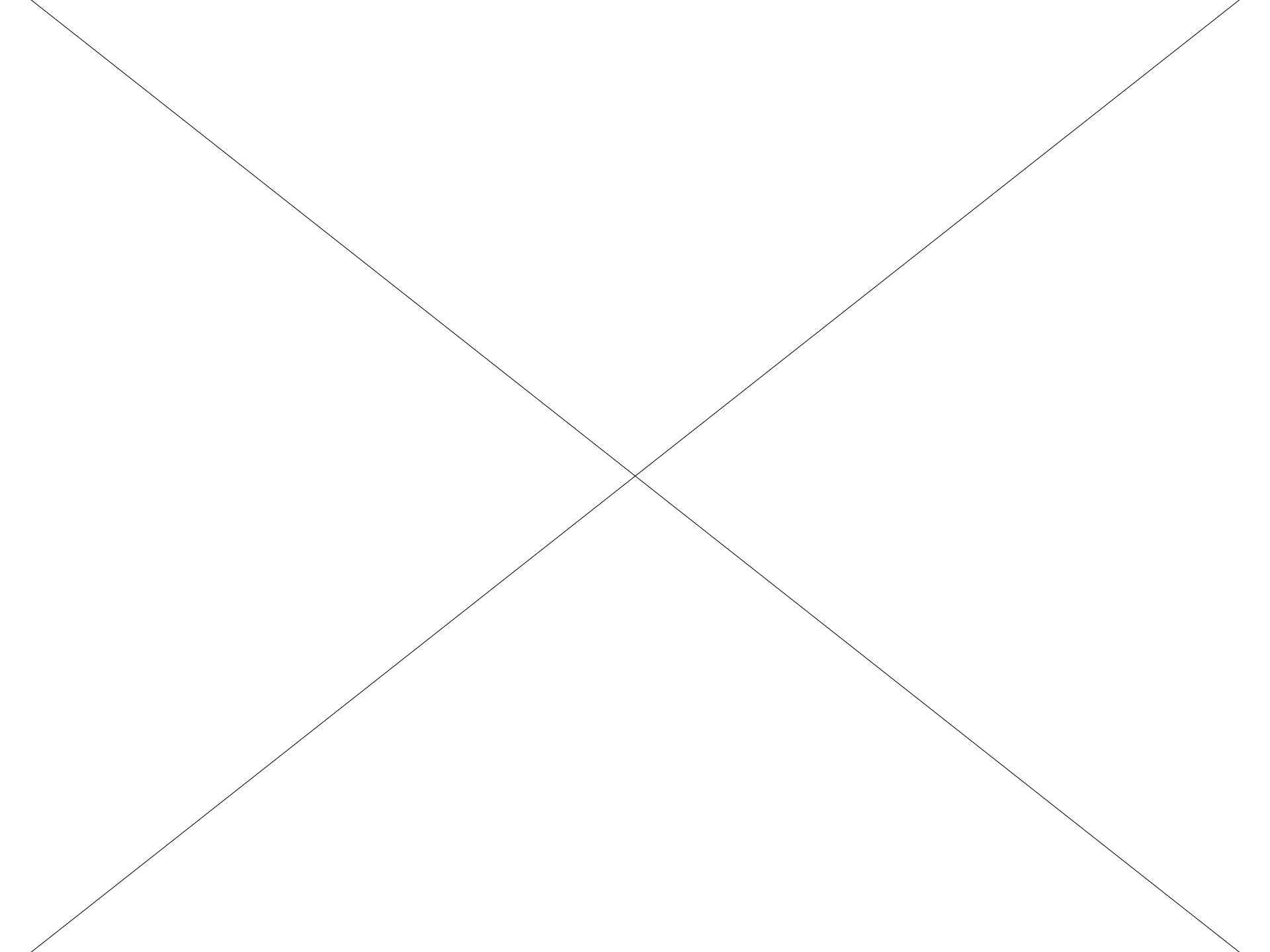
